Off Campus Life recommends you take your time when looking for off-campus housing. There are more apartments, condos and houses for rent in Gainesville than students to fill them. Off Campus Life is here to help you with finding off-campus housing, and we recommend following these steps to assist you with your housing search.

STEP 1: BUDGET

Most students typically live in 4-bedroom apartments with each person having their own bedroom and bathroom. Roommates share the kitchen and living room. These types of complexes allow students to meet other students and share the cost of off-campus housing.

Please see the average rental cost chart for monthly rent averages and additional costs associated with renting. It is important to factor the rent and additional costs into your monthly and yearly budget.

Keep in mind some properties include the costs of utilities, internet and furniture in the monthly rent and some do not. When touring ask what's included in rent.

STEP 2: FREE ONLINE OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING LOCATOR SERVICE

To search our database, visit OCL's Off-Campus Housing Locator at housing.offcampus.ufl.edu.

You can customize your search based on various criteria such as price, location, amenities, number of bedrooms, pet-friendly properties, etc. You can also use the locator to search for subleases, post subleases and find roommates.

STEP 3: TOUR PROPERTIES

Off Campus Life recommends you tour at least 5-6 different apartment complexes before you sign a lease off campus. See page 6 for apartment tour questions.

STEP 4: LEASES

Once you sign a lease, it is a legally binding agreement and often impossible to break or change. Gainesville has two types of leases: individual and joint.

An **individual lease** allows all roommates to sign their own lease. Under an individual lease, each roommate is responsible for their own rent. If a roommate does not pay their rent, the other roommates will not be held responsible for the rent.

The other type of lease is the **joint lease**, which is more common in houses and condominiums for rent. This lease also requires all residents to sign the lease, but under a joint lease, the landlord can hold the other roommates responsible for the cost if a roommate does not pay the rent.

Some complexes require students to have a guarantor or **co-signer for their lease**. The guarantor is typically a family member or friend who is willing to assume the monthly cost for the rent if for any reason you are not able to pay the rent.

Before signing the lease, make sure the move-in date is before classes begin and the move-out date is after finals are over. Visit the UF Registrar website for academic dates at registrar.ufl.edu.

What is a sublease? It is finding someone to take over your lease or taking over another student's lease for either a month, a semester, or a full 12-month lease. They are necessary in Gainesville and allow you the flexibility to find a short lease or to allow someone to take over your lease. OCL's Housing Locator housing.offcampus.ufl.edu allows you to post your subleases for free by using your ufl.edu email. To learn more about subleasing please visit offcampus.ufl.edu/resources/off-campus-housing.

Another resource for students at UF is Student Legal Services. You can set up an appointment with Student Legal Services to review the leases you are considering before you sign a lease. Visit the Student Legal Services website studentlegalservices.ufl.edu and click on apply for services. Even if you are not currently taking classes, you can still take advantage of this resource. Just note on your intake form that you are a new student.

STEP 5: SAFETY

Off Campus Life advises touring a prospective property at night to check for various night safeguards: Is there adequate lighting? Do you need to walk through an unlit area to get to the bus or parking lot? How's the complex noise level? For more safety tips visit the Off Campus life website offcampus.ufl.edu/resources/safety.

A great resource to check before signing a lease is City Protect. This website allows you to see crime that has occurred in certain areas in the past week or month. Visit the **City Protect website** *cityprotect.com* to search for crime statistics based on address.

STEP 6: TRANSPORTATION

Regional Transit System (RTS) bus system: Students pay a transportation fee as part of tuition. Simply show your Mobile GatorONE and you can take the bus anywhere, both on and off campus. To learn more about bus routes and RTS resources, please visit their website go-rts.com.

If you are interested in driving to campus, you must purchase a permit to park on campus between 7:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. After 4:30 p.m. on weekdays, you are able to park on campus in most areas without a permit. Be sure to read the signage for appropriate parking locations and hours.

To purchase a parking permit visit the Transportation and **Parking Services** website taps.ufl.edu to complete the online permit form. Permits are connected to your license plate, therefore your permit request is connected digitally to your vehicle.

Also provided by Transportation & Parking Services is UF SNAP, a nighttime pick-up and drop-off service available only on the UF campus. To order a SNAP ride download the UF SNAP by Spare app.

Overnight parking on campus is not available for students living off campus. For long-term storage parking off campus talk with your property management or landlord or visit the City of Gainesville website gainesvillefl.gov to learn more about garage parking locations and costs.

(Juestions TO ASK WHEN TOURING APARTMENTS

It never hurts to ask questions. Below are the top questions you should ask when touring a prospective apartment or rental home before you sign a lease. Visit offcampus.ufl.edu/tour to print additional copies of this page.

COST

- 1. What is the rent cost per month?
- 2. What is included in the rent? Utilities, water, electric, cable, internet? Is there a cap on utilities, if so how much is the cap?
- 3. Are the apartments furnished? Is there an additional cost for furniture?
- 4. Are there any move-in specials?
- 5. What other costs are necessary to move in? Application fee, administrative fee, deposit?
- 6. What options do I have to pay my rent? Can I pay with a credit card, check, or other options?
- 7. Will I need a guarantor? If I have a guarantor, will you waive the deposit? What is the cost if I don't have a guarantor?
- 8. Will I need to set up my own electric or other services?
- 9. When is the rent due? Is there a grace period? What are the late fees? When do they take effect?
- 10. Are pets allowed? Is there an additional deposit or monthly charge?
- 11. What are the requirements for a full refund of my deposit?

LEASE

- 12. What type of lease do you offer? Joint or individual?
- 13. How long is the lease? Can I get a shorter lease? Is there an additional monthly fee?
- 14. If I need to, can I sublease, relet or break my lease? Will I need to pay a sublease or relet fee?
- 15. Can I get a copy of the lease to review prior to signing? (UF Student Legal Services can review your lease before you sign it, for free! studentlegalservices.ufl.edu)

ROOMMATES & NEIGHBORS

- **16.** Do you provide roommate matching? How do you match roommates? What happens if I don't like my roommate; will you move me? Is there a fee to move? Is it possible that my roommates will be non-students?
- 17. Who lives in the complex? Is it undergraduate students, graduate students, non-students or families?

AMENITIES

- 18. Where is the nearest bus stop? What routes serve this complex? Do I have to walk through an unlit area to get to the bus? How often do they run?
- **19.** What facilities are offered (pool, gym, study rooms)? What are the hours?
- 20. Is parking provided? Do I have an assigned spot or do I need to purchase a parking permit? Is there a monthly or yearly cost? Is there guest parking? Do I need a city parking pass?
- 21. Does the complex organize any community events? If so, what types of events?

MANAGEMENT

- 22. How can I report problems with roommates or other tenants? How do you handle roommate and neighbor issues?
- 23. What types of maintenance issues do you have?
- 24. How old is the apartment complex or rental house?
- 25. When was the last time the complex and the unit I'm interested in were remodeled?
- 26. How do you handle pest control? What are your most common pests? Have you had any issues with bed bugs?
- 27. Do your maintenance or pest control providers enter apartments without giving notice?
- 28. How do I fill out a maintenance request?

SAFETY

- **29.** What type of security features do you provide? Do you have a security officer? If so, what type of support do they provide?
- 30. Is the community gated? Do you need a code or card to access the gate?
- 31. What is the most common safety complaint of residents?
- 32. Do the windows lock? Does the door have a deadbolt? Does the door have a peephole? Do individual resident rooms have a lock? Can I install locks? How can I verify that you've changed the locks between residents?
- 33. Have you had any crime on the property? If yes, how have you addressed crime that has occurred?

TRANSITIONING TO OFF CAMPUS LIFE

ROOMMATES

As in any relationship, communication is key. Share your expectations about all lifestyle topics including household chores, a rent/bill payment schedule, groceries, air conditioning temperature, having company over, etc. Make sure each party understands the expectations. Compromise each of your needs and wants to make sure that all parties are being fairly heard and respected.

Having roommates can be a good way to meet new people, learn and practice effective communication skills and save on living expenses.

ROOMMATE MATCHING VS. ROOMMATE PLACEMENT

Many apartment complexes offer roommate matching or roommate placement to help you find a roommate.

Roommate matching occurs when you fill out a form of preferences including living habits, cleanliness expectations, interests, etc.

Roommate placement is when apartment management will place you in any open space with no consideration of your living habits.

SOME RESOURCES AND OPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HELP YOU RESOLVE ROOMMATE CONFLICT ARE:

- Transfer: Talk with apartment management to see if a transfer is possible. Transferring might require you to pay a fee.
- Sublease: Make sure that you are able to sublease or relet your apartment according to your lease terms.

Tough It Out: If you cannot move, make the most of the situation and act maturely. Try to continue to communicate positively and respectfully.

DOES YOUR ROOMMATE NEED HELP?

If you are concerned about your roommate and want to help, consult with the CARE office through the Dean of Students Office. For more information please visit *umatter.ufl.edu*.

LANDLORD AND TENANT COMMUNICATION

Make sure to talk to your apartment management team or landlord about any concerns you have with their property, from repairs to roommate issues. Make sure you get any agreements between you and your landlord or apartment complex management in writing. If your landlord refuses to make repairs or hold up their end of the lease, get legal assistance from UF's Student Legal Services office studentlegalservices.ufl.edu.

MOVING OUT

Do not leave the move out process for the last minute. OCL recommends connecting with your apartment management or landlord for their expectations at least one month before vacating your apartment. Don't forget about boxes, cleaning supplies, cleaning costs, moving expenses, storage and the help needed to make the move happen. SAFETY

As you transition to living on your own there are many things you need to do to ensure your personal and property safety. Below is a short list; for more safety information please visit offcampus.ufl.edu/resources/safety.

- Be aware of your surroundings and do not walk alone at night.
- > Do not get into vehicles with strangers.
- > Remember to lock your apartment windows and doors.

- > Remember to secure your belongings.
- > If you see something suspicious, report it.

TRANSPORTATION

RecSports at UF has two workout facilities, an indoor track, tennis courts, volleyball and sand volleyball courts, basketball courts and racquetball/handball courts. RecSports provides personal training, physical assessments, intramural and e-sports leagues, sports clubs, nutrition counseling, daily group fitness classes and outdoor programming through the Center for Outdoor Recreation and Education (CORE) and Lake Wauburg.
